# Cambodia

# Human Capital Index 2020

This brief provides an update to the Human Capital Index (HCI). First launched in 2018, the HCI measures the amount of human capital that a child born today can expect to attain by age 18. It conveys the productivity of the next generation of workers compared to a benchmark of complete education and full health. Worldwide a child born in 2020 can expect, on average, to be 56 percent as productive as she could be when she grows up. All data represent the status of countries pre-COVID-19.

### THE HUMAN CAPITAL INDEX

**Human Capital Index.** A child born in Cambodia today will be **49 percent** as productive when she grows up as she could be if she enjoyed complete education and full health. This is lower than the average for East Asia & Pacific region but slightly higher than the average for Lower middle income countries.

- **Probability of Survival to Age 5. 97** out of 100 children born in Cambodia survive to age 5.
- Expected Years of School. In Cambodia, a child who starts school at age 4 can expect to complete 9.5 years of school by her 18th birthday.
- Harmonized Test Scores. Students in Cambodia score 452 on a scale where 625 represents advanced attainment and 300 represents minimum attainment.
- Learning-adjusted Years of School. Factoring in what children actually learn, expected years of school is only 6.8 years.
- Adult Survival Rate. Across Cambodia, 84 percent of 15-year olds will survive until age 60. This statistic is a proxy for the range of health risks that a child born today would experience as an adult under current conditions.
- Healthy Growth (Not Stunted Rate). 68 out of 100 children are not stunted. 32 out of 100 children are stunted, and so are at risk of cognitive and physical limitations that can last a lifetime.

#### DIFFERENCES IN HCI ACROSS GENDER AND SOCIO-ECONOMIC GROUPS

In Cambodia, lack of data prevents comparison of HCI by gender. Table 1 shows gender disaggregation for each of the HCI components, where available.

In Cambodia, there are not sufficient data to disaggregate HCI by socioeconomic groups.



Countries in the East Asia and Pacific (EAP) region have made remarkable progress on almost every dimension of human capital in the last decade (2010-2020). COVID-19, however, threatens to wipe out much of the progress. Action is needed to boost learning achievement; reinvigorate the health, nutrition, and education systems; and deploy social safety nets to protect the most vulnerable, thus enabling an inclusive and sustainable recovery and accelerating human capital accumulation.

#### DOMESTIC RESOURCE UTILIZATION AND MOBILIZATION


- Health Spending. Cambodia spends 1.4 percent (2017) of its GDP in public spending on health. This is lower than both the regional average (4.9%) and the average for its income group (2.8%). 15 percent (2014) of the population incurs catastrophic health expenditure measured as out-of-pocket spending exceeding 10% of household consumption or income.
- Education Spending. Cambodia spends 2.2 percent (2018) of its GDP in government education spending. This is lower than both the regional average (4.7%) and the average for its income group (4.5%).
- Social Assistance Spending. Cambodia spends 0.8 percent (2015) of its GDP on social assistance. This is lower than both the regional average (1.1%) and the average for its income group (1.4%).
- Government Revenue. General government revenue in Cambodia is 23.8 percent (2018) of GDP. This is lower than both the regional average (40.7%) and the average for its income group (27.3%).

### **COMPLEMENTARY INDICATORS**

- Learning Poverty. In Cambodia, 51 percent (2013) of 10-year-olds cannot read and understand a simple text by the end of primary school. This is higher than the average for its region (15%) but lower than the average for its income group (59%).
- Net Secondary Enrollment. In Cambodia, 38 percent (2008) of secondary-school age children are enrolled in secondary school. This is lower than both the average for its region (72%) and the average for its income group (57%).
- NCD Deaths. In Cambodia, the probability of dying between ages 30 and 70 from cardiovascular disease, cancer, diabetes, or chronic respiratory diseases is 21 percent (2016). This is similar to both the average for its region (21%) and its income group (21%).
- Diabetes. In Cambodia, 6 percent (2019) of the population ages 20-79 has type 1 or type 2 diabetes. This is lower than both the average for its region (12%) and the average for its income group (8%).
- Smoking. In Cambodia, 17 percent (2016) of the population age 15 and older are current smokers (34 percent among men). This is lower than both the average for its region (25%) and the average for its income group (19%).
- Universal Health Coverage (UHC) Index. The index, ranging from 0 to 100, measures coverage of essential health services based on tracer interventions. In Cambodia, the UHC Index score is 60 (2017). This is lower than the average for its region (65) but higher than the average for its income group (56).
- Social Safety Net Coverage. In Cambodia, data on social safety net coverage of the poorest quintile are not available. The average for its region is 45 percent and for its income group is 39 percent.
- Social Safety Net Adequacy. In Cambodia, data on social safety net adequacy for the poorest quintile are not available. The average for its region is 9 percent and for its income group is 19 percent.
- Human Capital Utilization. In Cambodia, 84 percent (2016) of the working-age population is employed. This is higher than both the average for its region (65%) and the average for its income group (54%).

- Female Labor Force Participation. In Cambodia, the female labor force participation rate is **76 percent** (2019). This is higher than both the average for its region (57%) and the average for its income group (50%).
- **Drinking Water.** In Cambodia, **79 percent** (2017) of the population has at least a basic source of drinking water. This is lower than both the average for its region (92%) and the average for its income group (81%).
